This lack of intervention can perpetuate a culture of silence and fear, making it imperative to understand the dynamics at play and develop effective strategies to combat this pervasive issue.

Immediate Intervention

- **Communicate Clearly:** Ensure that your school clearly communicates that anti-immigrant bullying will not be tolerated.
- **Re-examine School Policies:** Ensure your school bullying policies directly address anti-immigrant bullying.

Ongoing Support and Monitoring

- **Check-Ins:**
 - **Regular Monitoring:** Regularly check in with the targeted student to ensure they feel safe and supported. Monitor the situation to prevent further incidents.
